MARC EDELMAN is associate professor of anthropology at Hunter College and the Graduate Center of the City University of New York. His research interests include land tenure, peasant organizations, and economic and environmental change in Central America. He is the author of *The Logic of the Latifundio: The Large Estates of Northwestern Costa Rica Since the Late Nineteenth Century* (1992).

ALAN KNIGHT is professor of the history of Latin America and director of the Latin American Centre at Oxford University. In addition to his two-volume history, *The Mexican Revolution* (1986), he is the author of *U.S.-Mexican Relations, 1910–1940: An Interpretation* (1987) and co-editor with Jonathan C. Brown of *The Mexican Petroleum Industry in the Twentieth Century* (1992).

MITCHELL A. SELIGSON is professor of political science and research professor of international studies at the University of Pittsburgh, and past director of the university's Center for Latin American Studies. His research concentrates on two themes: the peasantry and democracy in Central America. His most recent books include *Elections and Democracy in Central America* (1989) and *Development and Underdevelopment: The Political Economy of Inequality* (1993).
