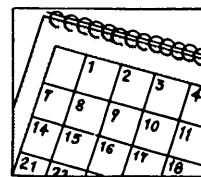

AMERICAN DIABETES ASSOCIATION RESEARCH GRANTS AND AWARDS FOR 1988–89

Medical Student Research Fellowship Program. Funds, up to \$25,000/yr for 5 years, are awarded to accredited U.S. medical schools to support the training of a minimum of 5 medical students/year. Participating students must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents in good standing in an accredited U.S. medical school and must have completed at least 1 year of medical school. Application deadline is 16 September 1988 for 1 January 1989 funding.

Mentor-Based Postdoctoral Fellowship Program. Awards in the amount of \$30,000/yr for 3 years are given to support a postdoctoral fellow working with an established diabetes investigator. The investigator must be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident and hold an appointment at a U.S. research institution. The fellow must have an MD or PhD degree, no more than 3 years of postdoctoral research experience, and cannot serve an internship or residency during the award period. Application deadline is 14 October 1988 for 1 July 1989 funding.

Research and Development Awards. These awards provide a maximum of \$65,000/yr for 3 years to support young investigators with 2–5 years of postdoctoral research experience. The funds are to be divided between salary (restricted to a maximum of \$40,000/yr) and other grant support (restricted to a maximum of \$35,000/yr). Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents and hold independent faculty positions at U.S. university-affiliated institutions. Application deadlines are 5 August 1988 for 1 January 1989 funding and 3 February 1989 for 1 July 1989 funding.

Feasibility Grants. These grants provide up to \$40,000/yr for 2 years for new and innovative diabetes research. The funds are to be used for equipment, supplies, and salary for technical assistance. Established diabetes investigators must propose marked departures from current research. Investigators in other fields are encouraged to apply their expertise to diabetes research. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents and be members of U.S. university-affiliated institutions. Application deadlines are 5 August 1988 for 1 January 1989 funding and 3 February 1989 for 1 July 1989 funding.

Lions Clubs International Clinical Research Program in Diabetic Eye Disease. This program supports clinical or applied research in diabetic retinopathy in the U.S. and abroad. Awards up to \$40,000/yr for 2 years will be given to support new treatment regimens, epidemiology, and translation research. In addition, training grants and grants for equipment will be considered. Application deadline is 3 February 1989 for 1 July 1989 funding.

Clinical Research Grant Program. Grants of up to \$50,000/yr are provided for 3 years for studies that directly involve humans. In vitro research on human blood or tissue samples

to measure effects of environmentally induced (e.g., diet, drugs) changes qualifies as clinical research under this program; simply using human tissues for laboratory research does not qualify. The funds may be used for equipment, supplies and/or salary (excluding principal investigator's salary). Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents and hold faculty level

appointments at U.S. university-affiliated institutions. Application deadline is 3 February 1989 for 1 July 1989 funding.
