1964 ANNUAL MEETING

As previously announced, the Annual Meeting in 1964, which had been scheduled for San Francisco in June, immediately preceding the Annual Session of the American Medical Association, has been cancelled. The American Diabetes Association is collaborating with the International Diabetes Federation in planning the program of the Fifth Congress in July 1964 in Toronto which will take the place of the usual Scientific Sessions of the Annual Meeting. However, the Annual Business Meeting and organizational Committee Meetings will be held at the time of the Congress.

DIABETES BINDERS

Binders for Volume 12 (1963) issues of DIABETES: *The Journal of the American Diabetes Association* will not be available until the end of the year. New binders will be prepared at that time to accommodate the regular six issues of the Journal, the Index, and the supplements to Volume 12 entitled *Diabetes-Related Literature Index*. NEWS NOTES

PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE RESEARCH GRANTS

The National Institute of Arthritis and Metabolic Diseases awarded the largest number of grants (2,754) and ranked third highest in amount (\$53,074,897) among the eight Institutes and seven Divisions of the United States Public Health Service which made research grants during the fiscal year 1962.

Total grants amounted to \$338,561,175. The grants for 15,661 projects were made to 1,211 universities, medical schools, and other nonprofit institutions in the United States and 341 in forty-nine other countries. They supported studies relating to major diseases and other public health problems, and also studies aimed at the discovery of fundamental knowledge in the biomedical sciences.
