The first will be a Symposium on "Current Management of Complications in Diabetes Mellitus," to be held in cooperation with the New Jersey State Department of Health on Wednesday, May 13, from 2 to 5 p.m., at Princeton Inn, Princeton, New Jersey. On the program are "Pituitary Stalk Section—A Mode of Management of Diabetic Retinitis," by Richard A. Field, M.D., Assistant Physician of Massachusetts General Hospital; "The Management of the Pregnant Diabetic Patient," by William P. Given, M.D., Associate Professor of Clinical Obstetrics and Gynecology at Cornell University Medical College; "Management and Pitfalls of the Juvenile Diabetic," by Abraham H. Kantrow, M.D., Pediatric Staff, Flushing Hospital, Flushing, New York; and Marvin F. Levitt, M.D., Associate Attending Physician, The Mount Sinai Hospital, New York.

The second Symposium will be held in cooperation with the Academy of Medicine of New Jersey and the New Jersey State Department of Health on Tuesday, May 19, from 2 to 4 p.m., at Haddon Hall, Atlantic City, during the Annual Meeting of the Medical Society of New Jersey. The topic will be "Oral Hypoglycemic Agents." Robert H. Areson, M.D., will be the moderator and the following speakers will participate: Charles R. Shuman, M.D., Clinical Professor of Medicine, Temple University, Philadelphia; Martin G. Goldner, M.D., Professor of Medicine, State University of New York; and LeRoy Pesch, M.D., Associate Professor of Medicine, Rutgers University Medical School.

The NEW YORK DIABETES ASSOCIATION (Clinical Society) will hold its Twelfth Annual Symposium on Saturday, October 10, at the Barbizon-Plaza Hotel, New York City.

The morning program, beginning at 9:30, will be devoted to "Hypoglycemic States." Among the papers to be given are "Classification and Diagnostic Considerations of Hypoglycemia," by Holbrooke S. Seltzer, M.D., Associate Professor of Internal Medicine, University of Texas, Southwestern Medical School, Dallas; "Dynamics of Insulin Secretion in Hypoglycemia," by Rosalyn S. Yalow, Ph.D., Assistant Chief, Radioisotope Service, Veterans Administration Hospital, Bronx, New York; "Enzymatic Defects as Causes of Hypoglycemia," by Barbara Illingworth, Ph.D., Research Associate Professor in Biological Chemistry, Washington University School of Medicine, St. Louis; and "Effects of Alcohol on the Blood Sugar," by Norbert Freinkel, M.D., Associate Professor of Medicine, Harvard University Medical School, Boston.

At the luncheon, which will begin at 12:30 p.m., the guest speaker will be George James, M.D., Commissioner of Health, New York City.

In the afternoon the chief topic will be "Inter-Relationship of Carbohydrate and Fat Metabolism." Papers will include "Regulation of Fat Storage and Release," by Howard A. Eder, M.D., Professor of Medicine, Albert Einstein College of Medicine, Yeshiva University, Bronx, New York; "Mechanisms of Ketogenesis and Hyperketonemia," by George F. Cahill, Jr., M.D., Associate Professor of Medicine, Harvard University Med-

ical School, Boston; and "Nonketotic Acidosis in Diabetes Mellitus," by William B. Schwartz, M.D., Professor of Medicine, Tufts University School of Medicine, Boston.

Attendance is open to physicians, medical students and other professional personnel interested in diabetes. Advance reservations are required. The registration fee is \$5.00, but there is no charge for members of the Clinical Society and certified medical students, interns, residents and fellows.
