### TWELFTH POSTGRADUATE COURSE

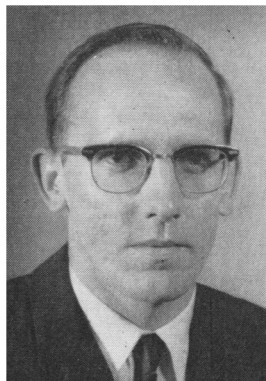
As previously announced, the Twelfth Postgraduate Course of the American Diabetes Association, entitled "Diabetes in Review: Clinical Conference 1965," will be held at The Drake hotel in Chicago, Illinois, Jan. 20, 21 and 22, 1965. Open to Doctors of Medicine, the Course is presented by the ADA Committee on Professional Education in cooperation with the Diabetes Association of Greater Chicago. As customary, the Preliminary Program with registration form is being sent to all Members of the Association. Those planning to attend should register early; by December 15, if possible, since hotel accommodations are limited. Immediately upon registration for the Course, a hotel reservation card will be sent to the registrant.

Arthur R. Colwell, Sr., M.D., Chicago, will deliver The Woodyatt Lecture, entitled "Milestones of Progress in Diabetes," on January 21 at 2:00 p.m. Among other features of the Course will be a symposium on "Disorders of Lipid Metabolism," with Edgar S. Gordon, M.D., Ph.D., Madison, Wisconsin, Daniel Rudman, M.D., New York, and Laurance W. Kinsell, M.D., Oakland, as participants. Tony Weitzel, Chicago columnist, will be guest speaker at the Banquet on Wednesday evening, January 20.

### WINNERS OF RESEARCH AND ESSAY CONTESTS

Harry K. Delcher, Gainesville, Florida, and Joseph J. Renn, III, M.D., formerly of Morgantown, West Virginia, have been selected by the American Diabetes Association as winners of the 1964 Research and Essay Contests.

Mr. Delcher was awarded the \$500 prize for the best paper submitted in the Research Contest. His prize-winning manuscript is entitled "Metabolism of In Vivo Labeled C-14 Lipoprotein Lipid in the Isolated Perfused Rat Heart." Mr. Delcher received a Bachelor of Science degree in Mathematics with honors from the University of Florida in Gainesville. He entered the University of Florida College of Medicine in 1961. In 1962-63, he was a Post-Freshman Research Fellow, working with Dr. Joseph C. Shipp, Associate Professor of Medicine, on the effect of pH,  $p\text{CO}_2$  and  $\text{HCO}_3^-$  on glucose metabolism in the isolated perfused rat heart. He is presently a third-year medical student with a part-time Medical Student Research Fellowship under Dr. Melvin Fried, Assistant Professor of Biochemistry, and Dr. Shipp.

Joseph J. Renn, III, M.D., was named winner of the \$250 prize for the best paper submitted in the 1964 Essay Contest. His paper is entitled "Acromegaly and Diabetes Mellitus: A Review of the Literature." Dr. Renn was graduated cum laude from Shepherd College in 1960 with a Bachelor of Science degree in biology. At that time he received the award for the outstanding senior in biology and was elected to Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges for the year 1959-60. He received his M.D. degree from West Virginia University School of Medicine in 1964. Dr. Renn is now a medical intern at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville.

In addition to the awards, Mr. Delcher and Dr. Renn each received a one-year subscription to DIABETES.

## 1965 RESEARCH AND ESSAY CONTESTS

Members of the American Diabetes Association and subscribers to DIABETES are asked to encourage medical students and physicians within five years after completion of medical school and bioscientists who are predoctoral or not more than two years postdoctoral to enter the 1965 Research and Essay Contests sponsored by the Association. Prizes to be awarded are as follows:

**RESEARCH CONTEST:** \$500 prize for the best paper reporting original work, whether laboratory investigation or clinical observation.

**ESSAY CONTEST:** \$250 prize for the best review article or case report.

The prize winners as well as those receiving Honorable Mention are also given a one-year subscription to DIABETES: *The Journal of the American Diabetes Association*.

The papers will be judged on the basis of the value of the material and manner of presentation. Any subject relating to diabetes and basic metabolic problems may be selected.

Papers entered in the Contests should not have been published previously. Appropriate manuscripts will be considered for publication in DIABETES.

The deadline for receipt of entries is April 15, 1965.

Manuscripts should be submitted in triplicate (original and two copies), typewritten and double spaced. A letter of transmittal should accompany the manuscript specifying the Contest being entered, and addressed to: Committee on Scientific Awards, American Diabetes Association, Inc., 18 East 48th Street, New York, N. ## 1965 LILLY AWARD DEADLINE

Dec. 1, 1964, is the deadline for receipt of nominations for the ninth Lilly Award which will be given at the Banquet on June 19, 1965, of the Twenty-fifth Annual Meeting of the American Diabetes Association. The annual award consists of \$1,000 and a medal. It is supported by Eli Lilly and Company. The following stipulations govern the contest:

**Purpose:** To recognize demonstrated research in the field of diabetes, taking into consideration independence of thought and originality.

**Eligibility:** Any investigator in an appropriate field of work, closely related to diabetes, who is less than forty years of age on January 1 of the year in which the award is made. The research will not necessarily be judged in comparison to the work of more mature and experienced workers. The candidate should be a resident of the United States or Canada.

**Nominations:** Nominations for the award will be solicited from the Members of the American Diabetes Association. Such nominations will be requested by repeated notices to be published in DIABETES. Names of nominees will be sent to the Chairman of the Committee on Scientific Awards and must be received before December 1 of the year preceding the award. The nomination should be accompanied by full information concerning the nominee's personality, training and research work. Six copies of each item should be submitted. No Member may send in more than one nomination. A list of the nominee's publications, if any, and six copies of the publication or manuscript for which the award may be given should also accompany the nomination. At the discretion of the Committee on Scientific Awards, the award may be given for work published during the year prior to December 1 of the year preceding the award. The nominee should be actively engaged at that time in the line of research for which the award is to be made.

**Announcement:** The name of the winner will be announced in DIABETES. The winner will be invited to present a paper on his work at the Annual Meeting. Papers considered for the award must be submitted with the idea that they will be published in whole or in part in DIABETES if found acceptable to the Editor and/or Editorial Board. If the Committee should decide that no outstanding work has been presented for this consideration, the award will not be made.

**Award:** In addition to the monetary award and medal, traveling expenses will be given to make it possible for the recipient to receive his award in person at the Annual Meeting.

### FELLOWSHIP IN JUVENILE DIABETES

The Department of Pediatrics of the University of Missouri Medical Center in Columbia, Missouri, is offering a traineeship in juvenile diabetes mellitus and metabolism. Appointments are for six to twenty-four months, beginning in January or July, 1965, although other starting dates can be arranged. The six-month traineeship is designed for internists. Two years of accepted residency in pediatrics or internal medicine are required.

The current program includes extensive inpatient and outpatient experience in the clinical aspects of the juvenile diabetic. The trainee also will participate in intensive clinical and laboratory research in the detection and study of chemical diabetes in siblings of children with diabetes mellitus.

Stipends are from \$5,000 to \$9,000, depending on previous experience and number of dependents.
