

study. Each division of this classification is considered separately. Maps, temperature graphs, rainfall graphs etc., are made and studied. The responses in each case are given special consideration, even to the preparation of product maps and compilation of various data. The writer has found it profitable to require the making of certain climatic maps from government data.—*Author's abstract.*

DISCUSSION

Dr. Humphreys thought it worth while to consider the question of how detailed the introductory meteorology course should be made and hoped Mr. Harding would submit his paper to the *Monthly Weather Review* so that readers could see what is being done about that question in certain places.

Mr. Cline asked the meeting if it was in favor of having Mr. Harding's paper published in the *Monthly*

Weather Review. (All were in favor.)

Mr. Middleton said the teachers' colleges were interested in the study of meteorology for purposes of background for studies in economic geography. He would like to see the paper published.

Dr. Landsberg said that in Germany the cooperation of school teachers in making local meteorological surveys was often obtained and that that usually led them to further interest in meteorology.

Mr. Harding felt the need of a text in meteorology for teachers' colleges; the existing ones are too technical and expensive and contain a lot of material that is of no use or interest to the prospective teacher. He hoped the members would keep that need in mind.

Mr. Cline remarked that he had heard the same request many times.
