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NINETEENTH POSTGRADUATE COURSE JANUARY 24, 25 AND 26

As previously announced, the American Diabetes Association will hold its Nineteenth Postgraduate Course, entitled "Diabetes in Review: Clinical Conference 1972," at the Sheraton-Four Ambassadors Hotel in Miami, Florida, January 24, 25 and 26.

The Course, to be given in cooperation with the University of Miami School of Medicine, is open to Doctors of Medicine and is presented under the direction of the Committee on Professional Education of the American Diabetes Association, chaired by Karl E. Sussman, M.D., of Denver. The program was developed by Daniel H. Mintz, M.D., Miami, Director of the Course, and a planning group of the Committee: George F. Cahill, Jr., M.D., of Boston, Stefan S. Fajans, M.D., of Ann Arbor, and Dr. Sussman.

FEES: \$100 for the three-day Course for Members of the American Diabetes Association; \$125 for nonmembers. *Residents* and *interns* as well as *fellows in a training status* who

have not completed five years of formal training (excluding the period of obligated government service) from outside the Miami area may register for a fee of \$25. *Residents, interns* and *fellows in a training status* cited above from the area of the Course may attend the Scientific Sessions without charge and should register by January 12. The full fee is payable when applications are made. The fee will be refunded upon written request received not later than January 12. The sum of \$10 will be deducted from all refunds for cancelled registrations. If space permits, *medical students* may register without charge after January 12.

The Preliminary Program was published in the October issue of this Journal. The Program including an application form has been mailed to all Members of the Association, to subscribers to DIABETES, and to most internists, general practitioners and other interested physicians throughout the country. THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL MEETING WILL BE HELD JUNE 18-25

The American Diabetes Association will hold its Thirty-second Annual Meeting at The Washington Hilton in Washington, D.C., the week of June 18. Scientific Sessions are scheduled for June 24-25.

In the same week, June 18-24, the Fourth International Congress of Endocrinology also will be held in Washington at the Sheraton-Park Hotel. Members of the American Diabetes Association who are participating in the organization and planning of the Congress include J. C. Beck, M.D., Montreal, Secretary General of the International Society of Endocrinology; David M. Kipnis, M.D., St. Louis, member of the Program Committee; and Lillian Recant, M.D., Co-Chairman of the Home Hospitality Committee.

Physicians and other scientists who would like to present papers at the Scientific Sessions of the American Diabetes Association are invited to submit abstracts to Norbert Freinkel, M.D., Chairman of the Committee on Scientific Programs. Ten copies of the abstracts, which are requested in order to expedite review by the Committee, should be sent as soon as possible, but postmarked no later than March 1, to Dr. Freinkel in care of the American Diabetes Association, Inc., 18 East 48th Street, New York, N.Y. 10017.

Abstracts which have been offered to other national societies should not be submitted.

SUBMISSION OF ABSTRACTS

1. A Member of the Professional Section may submit no more than two abstracts, one as author, and one as coauthor. He may, in lieu of submitted abstracts, introduce no more than two abstracts on behalf of nonmembers. When submitting one abstract he may introduce one abstract by a nonmember.

2. While utilizing his prerogative with respect to a total of two abstracts, the name of a Member may appear once again as coauthor, providing that the abstract was submitted by another Member. He may not, however, have another abstract of his own introduced by another Member.

3. Abstracts of nonmembers must be introduced by Members of the Professional Section in accordance with #1 (see above) and are limited to one for a nonmember.

4. Abstracts are limited to 300 words. Those exceeding 300 words will not be accepted. The number of words contained in the abstract (excluding the title and authors) should appear at the end of the abstract.

5. Abstracts must be double spaced and ten copies must be submitted.

6. The heading of abstracts should be in the following form:

- a. Title(s), first letters of major words being capitalized.
- b. Author(s) name(s), no degrees (e.g., M.D.), or academic titles should be included.
- c. Members of the Professional Section serving as authors should be indicated by an asterisk.

d. City and State of origin of work.

7. Abstracts accepted will be printed as submitted to the Chairman of the Committee on Scientific Programs. They should be carefully written and edited prior to submission. Changes may not be made after they have been submitted.

8. Abstracts must be postmarked not later than March 1, 1972.

9. Abstracts should not contain acknowledgments, diagrams, charts, tables or references. Charts or tables may be sent to aid the Committee in selecting abstracts for the program, but reference to charts, tables, etc., should not be made in the text since they will not appear in the published abstracts.

10. Papers are to be presented by the first author listed. Presentation at the Annual Meeting will be strictly limited to ten minutes to allow time for discussion.

11. Each abstract is to be accompanied by a self-addressed postal card containing the title of the abstract and names of all authors and the return address of the senior author.

FOURTH ALLIED HEALTH POSTGRADUATE COURSE

The American Diabetes Association will hold the Fourth Allied Health Postgraduate Course in Diabetes April 17-19 in Nashville, Tennessee, in cooperation with Vanderbilt University. The program was developed by Alan L. Graber, M.D., Director of the Course, with Co-Directors Oscar B. Crofford, M.D., Philip W. Felts, M.D., and Addison B. Scoville, Jr., M.D., and will be presented under the auspices of the Committee on Professional Education of the Association, chaired by Karl E. Sussman, M.D., of Denver.

The Course is offered in recognition of the need to convey the most current knowledge and teaching technics to members of the health team who are concerned with instruction of diabetic patients and their families. It is directed in particular to nurses, nutritionists and dietitians.

The printed program, which will include a registration form, will be sent to all Members of the Association in January or early February. The form should be completed and mailed with the registration fee as soon as possible. Holiday Inn-Vanderbilt will serve as headquarters and a room reservation card will accompany the application acceptance.
