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Twentieth Postgraduate Course

Entitled "Diabetes in Review: Clinical Conference 1973," the Twentieth Postgraduate Course of the American Diabetes Association will be held at the Hotel St. Francis in San Francisco, California, Monday through Wednesday, January 22, 23, and 24. It will be presented under the direction of the Committee on Professional Education of which Karl E. Sussman, M.D., Denver, is Chairman, and given by the Association and the Northern California Diabetes Association in cooperation with the University of California School of Medicine in San Francisco, and the Stanford University School of Medicine in Palo Alto. Open to Doctors of Medicine, the program was developed by Peter H. Forsham, M.D., San Francisco, Director of the Course, and Co-Directors Gerald M. Reaven, M.D., and G. B. Robson, M.D., of Palo Alto and San Francisco, along

with a planning group of the Committee: Dr. Sussman, George F. Cabill, Jr., M.D., of Boston, and John K. Davidson, M.D., Ph.D., of Atlanta.

REGISTRATION: A Preliminary Program which includes an application form is being mailed to all Members of the Association, to subscribers to DIABETES, and to most internists, general practitioners, and other interested physicians throughout the country. This form should be completed and mailed with the registration fee as soon as possible to J. Richard Connelly, Executive Director, American Diabetes Association, Inc., 18 East 48th Street, New York, N.Y. 10017. Applications will be accepted in the order received and registrations officially confirmed.

The Registration Desk will be open at the Hotel St. Francis

on Sunday, January 21, from 5:00 to 10:00 p.m., and will be open Monday at 8:00 a.m. Everyone is urged to register before 9:00 a.m. on Monday. At the time of registration for the Course, each registrant will receive a syllabus containing abstracts or outlines of the lectures.

WORKSHOPS: Registrants will be given an opportunity to indicate their order of preference for each of the two day's workshops. A form for the purpose will be sent with the confirmation of registration and should be returned promptly to the National Office. Assignments will be made in the order requested insofar as possible. Workshop designations will be issued at the Registration Desk.

FEES: \$100 for Members of the American Diabetes Association; \$125 for nonmembers. Residents and interns as well as fellows in a training status who have not completed five years of formal training (excluding the period of obligated government service) from outside the area of the Course may register for a fee of \$25. Residents, interns, and fellows in the training status cited above, from the area of the Course may attend without charge and should register by January 10. The full fee is payable when applications are made. The fee, less

a cancellation charge of \$10, will be refunded upon written request received not later than January 10. If space permits, medical students may register without charge after January 10.

HOTEL ACCOMMODATIONS: The Hotel St. Francis will serve as headquarters, and a room reservation card will accompany the application acceptance. The hotel cannot guarantee reservations received after January 2.

SOCIAL HOUR: A Social Hour will be held by subscription on Monday, January 22, starting at 6:30 p.m. There will be no banquet.

LUNCHEON: The luncheon on Monday, January 22, will be by subscription, and a reservation form will be sent with the registration confirmation.

DECEMBER 1: DEADLINE FOR LILLY AWARD APPLICATIONS

The 1973 Lilly Award will be given at the Thirty-third Annual Meeting of the American Diabetes Association. The following stipulations govern the contest for this annual award, which is supported by Eli Lilly and Company and consists of \$1,000 and a medal.

Purpose: To recognize demonstrated research in the field of diabetes, taking into consideration independence of thought and originality.

Eligibility: Any investigator in an appropriate field of work, closely related to diabetes, who is less than forty years of age on January 1 of the year in which the award is made. The research will not necessarily be judged in comparison with the work of more mature and experienced workers. The candidate should be a resident of the United States or Canada.

Nomination: Nominations for the award will be solicited from the Members of the American Diabetes Association. Such nominations will be requested by repeated notices to be published in DIABETES. Names of nominees must be received before December 1 of the year preceding the award. The nomination should be accompanied by full information concerning the nominee's personality, training, and research work. Eleven copies of each item should be submitted. No Member

may send in more than one nomination. A list of the nominee's publications, if any, and eleven copies of the publication or manuscript for which the award is to be given should also accompany the nomination. The award may be given for work published during the year prior to December 1 of the year preceding the award. The nominee should be actively engaged at that time in the line of research for which the award is to be made.

Announcement: The name of the winner will be announced in DIABETES. The winner will be invited to present a paper on his work at the Annual Meeting. Papers considered for the award must be submitted with the idea that they will be published in whole or in part in DIABETES if found acceptable to the Editor and/or Editorial Board. If the Committee should decide that no outstanding work has been presented for this consideration, the award will not be made.

Award: In addition to the monetary award and medal, traveling expenses will be given to make it possible for the recipient to receive his award in person at the Annual Meeting.

THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL MEETING SCIENTIFIC SESSIONS JUNE 23-24

The American Diabetes Association will hold its Thirty-third Annual Meeting at The Drake in Chicago, Illinois, the week of June 17. A special mailing will be sent to the membership in December outlining the procedure to be followed for submission of abstracts of papers to be presented at the Scientific Sessions June 23-24.

ABSTRACTS DEADLINE FOR EIGHTH IDF CONGRESS

As previously announced, the deadline for submission of abstracts for the Eighth Congress of the International Diabetes Federation is December 31, 1972. The Congress will be held in Brussels, Belgium, July 15-20, 1973, under the high patronage of Their Majesties the King and Queen of the Belgians. The program will consist of special lectures, contributed papers, a sociomedical program, panel discussions, workshops on selected topics, and a teaching program to provide postgraduate courses in clinical diabetes for physicians. The Diaz Cristobal Prize of \$5,000 will be given for the first time during the Congress. The Prize was established by Jose Diaz Cristobal of Madrid, and will be granted each third year by the Spanish Society of Diabetes for the most important research work performed on diabetes throughout the world.
