TWENTY-FIRST POSTGRADUATE COURSE

"Diabetes in Review: Clinical Conference 1974," the Twenty-first Postgraduate Course of the American Diabetes Association, was held at the Marriott Motor Hotel in Philadelphia, January 23, 24, 25, and 26, under the direction of the Committee on Professional Education of which Karl E. Sussman, M.D., Denver, is Chairman, and given by the Association in cooperation with the University of Pennsylvania and Temple University. The program

was developed by Albert I. Winegrad, M.D., Philadelphia, Director of the Course, and Co-Directors Anthony D. Morrison, M.D., and Charles R. Shuman, M.D., both of Philadelphia, together with a planning group of the Committee: Dr. Sussman; Edgar A. Haunz, M.D., Grand Forks, North Dakota; Robert J. S. Metz, M.D., Seattle, and Manuel Tzagournis, M.D., Columbus, Ohio.

THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING

The Regency Hyatt House in Atlanta, Georgia, will be the site of the Thirty-fourth Annual Meeting of the American Diabetes Association to be held the week of June 9. The Central Council will meet on Thursday, June 13, and the Board of Directors Friday, June 14.

Scientific Sessions are scheduled for Friday evening, Saturday and Sunday, June 14-16. A special mailing has been sent to the membership outlining the procedures to be followed for submission of abstracts, together with a form on which they are to be typed.

The program, which will include abstracts of all papers to be presented (except the Banting Memorial Lecture), as well as those By Title, will be issued as a supplement to this Journal and will be distributed without charge to Members and Journal subscribers.

SCIENTIFIC SESSIONS

The Scientific Sessions are open to members of the medical and allied professions. There is no registration fee for Members of the Association and an advance registration form will be mailed in May. The registration fee for all others is \$10.00, which includes a copy of the Program.

THE ENDOCRINE SOCIETY

The Annual Meeting and Scientific Sessions of The Endocrine Society will be held at the Regency Hyatt House in Atlanta June 12-14. Members of the American Diabetes Association will be

admitted without charge to the Friday afternoon (carbohydrate) session only of The Endocrine Society upon presentation of their badges or ADA membership cards; however, they must register with the Society at the Regency Hyatt.

SIXTH ALLIED HEALTH POSTGRADUATE COURSE

The American Diabetes Association will hold its Sixth Allied Health Postgraduate Course in Diabetes April 22-24 in Atlanta, Georgia. The course will be presented under the auspices of the Committee on Professional Education of the Association, chaired by Karl E. Sussman, M.D., of Denver, and given in cooperation with the Diabetes Association of Atlanta and the Emory University School of Medicine. John K. Davidson, M.D., Ph.D., Atlanta, is Director of the course. Co-Directors are Maria T. Alogna, R.N., Mary Goldsmith, R.D., and Tevora S. Riley, R.N., all of Atlanta.

The course is directed in particular to nurses, nutritionists and dietitians. Fee for members of the Professional Sections of the Association is \$75.00 and for nonmembers \$90.00. The fee includes the Banquet and Luncheon. The fee, less a cancellation charge of \$10.00, will be refunded upon written request received no later than April 15.

The preliminary program, together with a list of faculty, was published in the January issue of this Journal. The program, which includes an application form, has been mailed to all members and Journal subscribers in the United States and Canada. It is also being sent to thousands of leaders in dietetics and nursing throughout the country. The form should be completed and mailed with the registration fee as soon as possible. The program is approved by The American Dietetic Association for fifteen hours of continuing education.
