THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING JUNE 14-16 IN ATLANTA

The Regency Hyatt House in Atlanta, Georgia, will be the site of the Scientific Sessions of the Thirty-fourth Annual Meeting of the American Diabetes Association June 14-16. The Central Council will meet on Thursday, June 13, and the Board of Directors Friday, June 14. Pertinent information about the meeting together with a hotel reservation card has been mailed to the membership.

REGISTRATION

The Scientific Sessions are open to members of the medical and allied professions. There is no registration fee for members of the Association or The Endocrine Society. The registration fee for all others is \$10.00, which includes a copy of the printed Program. Copies of the Program may be purchased at \$2.00 each. Everyone is required to register, and admission is by badge only.

THE ENDOCRINE SOCIETY

The Endocrine Society will hold its fifty-sixth annual meeting at the Regency Hyatt House in Atlanta June 12-14. Members of the American Diabetes Association will be admitted without charge to the Friday afternoon (carbohydrate) session only of The Endocrine Society upon presentation of their Thirty-fourth Annual Meeting badges or 1974 ADA membership cards; however, they must register with the Society at the Regency Hyatt.

SCIENTIFIC SESSIONS

Ninety-two papers, in addition to the Banting Memorial Lecture and the Friday evening sessions, have been selected for presentation from among the 189 Abstracts submitted for consideration of the Committee on Scientific Programs under the chairmanship of Norbert Freinkel, M.D., Chicago. Except for the Banting Memorial Lecture, there will be dual sessions on Saturday and Sunday mornings and afternoons. These will be devoted to ten minute scientific presentations, which will conclude at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, June 16.

The titles of papers to be presented, those to be read By Title, and the Abstracts of both (except the Banting Memorial Lecture) will be published as a supplement to this Journal prior to the meeting. It will be distributed without charge to members of the Professional Section of the Association and to Journal subscribers.

Friday Evening Sessions

Dual sessions will be held from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. on Friday evening, June 14. Scheduling these sessions was favored by every five of six of those who responded to a questionnaire sent to the membership in December. One structured session, with invited speakers, will be devoted to "Therapeutic Issues in Diabetes Mellitus: Pathogenesis and Treatment of Nephropathy." The other will feature ten-minute papers selected from the submitted Abstracts.

MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

*Albert E. Renold, M.D., Geneva, Switzerland, will deliver the Banting Memorial Lecture at the close of the Scientific Sessions on Saturday morning, June 15, and will receive a Banting Medal.

*Jesse Roth, M.D., Bethesda, Maryland, will receive the 1974 Lilly Award for his accomplishments in demonstrating the secretion of growth hormone, the secretion of proinsulin and the assessment of its blood levels, and more recently, in the important area of hormone receptors in various tissues such as liver and lymphocytes.

*Mrs. Ruth Lawson Hanson of Birmingham, Alabama, has been selected by the Central Council to receive the Association's Outstanding Affiliate Service Award. The Award will be presented to Mrs. Hanson at the Central Council Dinner on Thursday, June 13.
