

BOOK REVIEW

ENDOCRINOLOGY AND DIABETES. THE THIRTIETH HAHNEMANN SYMPOSIUM, edited by Leonard J. Kryston, M.D., and Ralph A. Shaw, M.D., Ph.D. \$29.75, 533 pages, New York, Grune and Stratton, 1975.

This book is comprised of lectures given during the Thirtieth International Symposium conducted by the Hahnemann Medical College and Hospital in Philadelphia in May, 1973. It has forty-nine chapters compiled by sixty-seven authors; the chapters are grouped into ten parts: (1) Hormonal action and control mechanisms; (2) Pituitary disorders; (3) Thyroid disorders; (4) Adrenal disease; (5) Problems of calcium metabolism; (6) Gonadal disorders; (7) Diagnosis and treatment of diabetes mellitus; (8) Management of the difficult diabetic; (9) Vascular complications of diabetes; and (10) Hypoglycemia. This ambitious outline may suggest that the editors are in competition with Williams' *Textbook of Endocrinology* in offering the reader a complete, concise, and precise review of the broad field of endocrinology. This unfortunately is not the case.

The text lacks cohesiveness. Firstly, there is little or no coordination between chapters in content or style. Secondly, there is no obvious relationship between the space allotted to a topic and the clinical prevalence of or the amount of new knowledge acquired in that entity. Thirdly, regardless of the length of the chapters and the prominence of their respective authors, some topics are discussed very superficially and casually while others contain thorough, factual, and valuable information delivered skillfully. Fourthly, in some chapters areas are reviewed by individuals who themselves had not contributed to the available information as investigators, while in others relevant findings are reported for the first time in a scientific manner.

The preface of the book indicates that recent advances in endo-

crinology and diabetes are being covered and rational approaches in the application of these advances to clinical practice are being offered. Many but not all chapters satisfy the first of these goals. However, the date of the Symposium was May, 1973, not 1975! A two-year lag period in the publication of the proceedings of a symposium that had the goal of reviewing the recent advances in a field of dynamic research is most disadvantageous. Such a delay would not have been acceptable even if the contents were presentations of newly acquired information for the first time. Furthermore, the coverage of the advances is frequently incomplete even for 1973. On the contrary, some chapters contain dogma that has been excluded from modern textbooks of endocrinology. The second goal, namely that of application of new knowledge to clinical medicine, is also partially fulfilled and in a superficial, disorganized manner.

The attractive cover and the fine quality of paper and print reflect the immense time and effort that must have been put into the preparation of this book. This reviewer is frustrated and saddened not to be able to identify a fulfilled purpose or place for this publication. There are two obvious conclusions: (1) The proceedings of a postgraduate review course in endocrinology and metabolism are extremely difficult to mold into a useful format in a sufficiently short period of time. The syllabi in outline form distributed to the audience at the time of such postgraduate courses are far more meaningful, efficient, and functional. (2) There is an urgent need for "reform" in the establishment called "postgraduate review course." The objectives and goals of such courses have to be identified and defined carefully, the methods for their implementation have to be described professionally by educators, investigators, and clinicians, and the end product should be scrutinized at all levels at all times in an attempt to improve them continuously.
