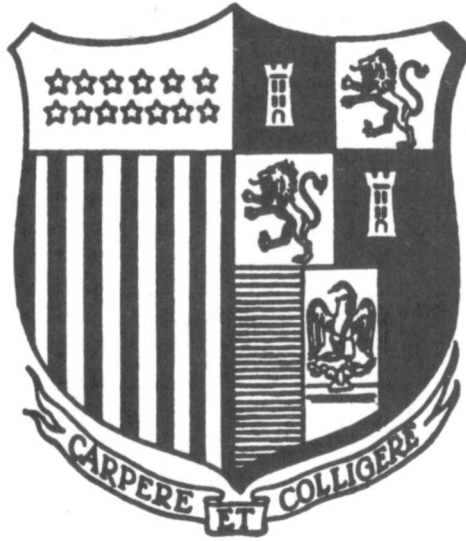

CONTRIBUTORS

RICHARD H. PETERSON, an alumnus of the University of California, Berkeley, took an M.A. degree at San Francisco State University and received his Ph.D. in history from the University of California, Davis, in 1971. His publications include *Manifest Destiny in the Mines: A Cultural Interpretation of Anti-Mexican Nativism in California, 1848-1853* (San Francisco, 1975) and *The Bonanza Kings: The Social Origins and Business Behavior of Western Mining Entrepreneurs, 1870-1900*, published by the University of Nebraska Press, 1977, as well as several scholarly articles, including one in this quarterly. He is associate professor of history at San Diego State University, having joined the faculty in 1978.

ABRAHAM HOFFMAN received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from Los Angeles State University and his doctorate in history from the University of California, Los Angeles. After a stint as curator of the Western History Collections in the University of Oklahoma, Norman, he returned to Los Angeles and has resumed teaching. He is the author of *Unwanted Mexican Americans in the Great Depression* (University of Arizona Press, 1974) and his long awaited study on the Owens Valley will be published in the spring of 1981 by the Texas A & M University Press. A frequent contributor of scholarly articles to learned journals, the article published here was presented to the Pacific Coast Branch of the American Historical Association meeting held on the USC campus in August 1980.

LEONARD LEADER has had a multi-faceted career — labor leader, journalist, writer, teacher. Of all of these, his love and established reputation is as a superb classroom teacher. Students at now defunct Immaculate Heart College will long remember his courses and those who have heard him on the public lecture platform share a like opinion. He received his Ph.D. in history from UCLA and his revised doctoral dissertation, a study of Los Angeles during the Great Depression, is scheduled for publication. During the academic year 1980/81, he will be a member of the faculty in the USC School of Journalism.
