

Since 1957, twelve of the participants have received their Master of Science degrees and nine have received the Ph.D. All nine of the Ph.D.'s list the summer institute program as a motivating force in continuing their education. Four others are completing the final stages of the Ph.D. degree.

Twenty-three of the 46 participants have attended at least one additional institute, four attended two institutes, three attended four institutes and two attended six institutes.

The participants include two presidents of NABT, two state and regional winners of the Outstanding Biology Teacher Award, BSCS teachers, regional BSCS representatives, and members of writing teams of science projects.

The writer was particularly impressed by the intangibles mentioned in the responses of the institute members. Many stated that this experience was a prime motivator in their securing an advanced degree. Others consider it one of their most profitable educational experiences. Much of this reaction must be attributed to the manner in which the institute was conducted. The director and the guest lecturers entered into the

summer program with a tremendous amount of zeal and energy.

Help with Draft Problems Available

Timely information for Selective Service Registrants who are in school or working in critical occupations is available in a publication from the Scientific Manpower Commission. Pertinent and succinct information on the responsibilities and rights of registrants subject to the draft is provided in this brochure, including new Selective Service criteria for student deferments, rules for classification, and procedures for appeal.

The brochure defines the Selective Service classifications, including the priority categories of I-A; explains the procedures for screening Reservists who have critical civilian occupations; describes the functions of State Advisory Committees on Scientists and Engineers; and lists the addresses of State Directors of Selective Service.

Students, university faculty and staff members, scientists and engineers, and employers of critical manpower will find this information useful.
