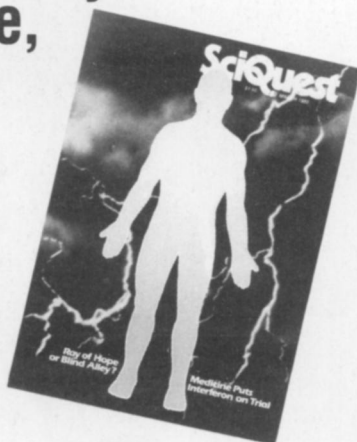

evolution—this has already been done. Nor should it be a point-by-point refutation of the creationist misrepresentations of evolutionary theory. It should be in the form of a critique of creationism as science, and an explication of its roots in 121-year-old anti-evolutionism that is based on the literal scientific truth of the Genesis accounts of the King James Version. No matter how creationists attempt to disassociate themselves from religion, their presentations, their literature, and their credo clearly delineate theirs as a religious, not a scientific position. As I said at the conclusion of my testimony to the Senate Education Committee, Colorado has selected a state dinosaur; it does not need to select a state religion.

Errata

In "Why Leaves Turn Color: A Laboratory Model for Hypothesis Formation" (*ABT* 43(3):163), several errors were made. The author, Stephen Klein, is with Shenendehowa High School. In the first full paragraph in column 2 of p. 163, the second sentence should read as follows: "Usually, one student per class realizes that the two alternatives are *not* mutually exclusive."

The genus name for oaks is *Quercus*, not *Oeurecus*. In step 1 of the experiment, a 25 by 200mm test tube should be used. In step 3 of the experiment, the last sentence should read as follows: "Reposition the cork and hook. . ." The year of publication of the Weier text is 1970.

I regret that these errors were made and apologize to the author and our readers for any inconvenience they may have caused.
