Why Animal Experimentation Matters: The Use of Animals in Medical Research. Ellen Frankel Paul and Paul. 2001. Publishers (ISBN 0-8052-1445-1). 224 pp. Hardback.

Almost anyone who studies biology will eventually have questions about the use of animals in experimental research. Questions may come up in a student working on a research paper, or simply someone wanting to know more about animal testing or the use of animals in medical research. Regardless of the motivation of the reader, the biology teacher needs an accurate, factual introduction. **Why Animal Experimentation Matters** is an attempt to answer some of these questions.
