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# Bibliography

In this book, congressional documents are often cited as sources of memoranda, of previously published articles, and of other materials. Besides making the bibliographic scheme more efficient, and revealing where materials that otherwise would be nearly unobtainable can more easily be found, this illuminates how the original materials have been used in congressional investigations of privacy-related matters. *Data on the original materials can be found in the cited documents.*

Thus USHR 102 refers to a House Report from the 102nd session of Congress. Similarly Senate reports are referred to as USSR xxx-yyy with the same meanings for xxx and yyy. Hearings are cited as USHH (House of Representatives) and USSH (Senate) followed by the Congressional session number.

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
