- “Intuitively Obvious”** A series of videos in which MIT students talk about racial attitudes
- IAP** Independent Activities Period, alternative classes offered during MIT’s month-long winter break
- J. J.** Judy Jackson, whose interview appears on the CD
- KLH** An early stereo speaker manufacturer started by MIT graduates, originally in Cambridge, since sold and relocated
- Kresge** Kresge Auditorium, the MIT performance hall
- Lobdell** Lobdell Hall, the main MIT dining center
- Mass Ave** Popular name of Massachusetts Avenue, Boston and Cambridge
- Metco** Metropolitan Council on Education, in which black inner-city students from Boston were bused to schools in affluent suburbs
- MCATs** Medical College Admission Tests
- MITES** Minority Introduction to Engineering and Science, founded in 1974; a summer program for gifted high-school students
- MSTP** Medical Scientist Training Program
- NAACP** National Association for the Advancement of Colored People
- NACME** National Action Council for Minorities in Engineering
- NIH** National Institutes of Health
- NJIT** New Jersey Institute of Technology
- NSBE** National Society of Black Engineers
- OME** Office of Minority Education, established in 1975 to assist minority students at MIT
- OSP** Office of Sponsored Programs
- Project Epsilon** Forerunner of Project Interphase
- Project Interphase** A summer program established in 1969 to enhance the preparedness of underrepresented minority students entering MIT in the fall
- Project XL** A supplement to Project Interphase, established in the late 1980s as a voluntary program to help first-year students achieve academic excellence
- QEM** Quality Education for Minorities Network
- RA** Research Assistant
- RLE** Research Laboratory of Electronics
- Robert Taylor Network** An initiative by BAMIT to develop a globally accessible electronic, multimedia archive, including film, video, text, still images, and audio recordings, documenting the contributions of people of African descent to science and technology
- Rodney King** The victim of a notorious police action in Los Angeles, an incident which aroused a national furor
- RPI** Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute
- SAP** Systems, Application and Products in Data Processing, the system adopted by MIT in 1995 for management of financial data
- SATs** Scholastic Aptitude Tests
- SCLS** Southern Christian Leadership Conference
- SDS** Students for a Democratic Society
- SNCC** Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (“Snick”)
- Southie** South Boston, an Irish–American enclave
- Southwest Corridor** A major highway project, abandoned in the 1970s owing to public opposition
- SPURS** Special Program for Urban and Regional Studies
- SSRC** Social Science Research Council
- TA** Teaching Assistant
- TCCP** Thirteen College Curriculum Program
- The T** The Boston public transportation system
- The Tech** Student-run on-campus newspaper
