Feeding the Other: Whiteness, Privilege, and Neoliberal Stigma in Food Pantries is the fifteenth book in the Food, Health, and the Environment series. The series explores the global and local dimensions of food systems and the issues of access; social, environmental, and food justice; and community well-being. Books in the series focus on how and where food is grown, manufactured, distributed, sold, and consumed. They address questions of power and control; social movements and organizing strategies; and the health, environmental, social, and economic factors embedded in food system choices and outcomes.
