Bibliographic Note

Most of the sources used in this book are Web pages easily accessible to the reader. Because I cite many Wikimedia related pages, I elide some information from their preferred format for brevity: I use “Wikipedia” as the author and publisher, rather than “Wikipedia contributors” and “Wikipedia, The Free Encyclopedia” respectively. Given the large amount of grammatical and syntactical deviations online, and that some sources are not native English speakers, I mostly present quoted text verbatim, with minimal corrections or editorial caveats such as “[sic].” In the printed book I do not provide URLs for printed or easily locatable sources. For online sources, where available, the versioned URL (i.e., a “stable” or “permanent” link) is used. I sometimes reference different versions of the same wiki page or older versions so as to provide a historical source, for comparison, or because I noted text that might have been subsequently edited—wikis do change—but I expect that its spirit remains the same.

However, I recommend consulting the online bibliography where I include hypertextual references whenever possible, including for printed sources now online. This is common for recent works, sometimes as preprints or author’s copies, and for older works in the public domain; I use the publication date of the version I used. For older works, if necessary, I often mention the original publication date. Page numbers might refer to the original pagination or to an online printout; I hope it will be clear to the reader which is the case.

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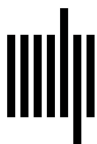
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
