

APPENDIX 1: FEMINICIDE DATA ACTIVISTS INTERVIEWED FOR THIS BOOK

The Data Against Femicide team conducted semistructured interviews with more than seventy-five participants directly involved in the forty-one projects listed ahead. Groups gave permission to be listed here and provided suggestions about which information they wanted to make publicly available about themselves. The interviews took place via Zoom between June 2020 and June 2023. They were conducted in activists' native languages and lasted between one and two hours. We aimed to understand the workflow, data production process, and conceptual categories through which activists identified and documented femicide and fatal gender-related violence, as well as their reflections on challenges and lessons learned from their monitoring work.

The interview questionnaire was developed based on exploratory conversations with different activists and civil society groups and was tested and adjusted based on their feedback. The interviews were recorded with permission from the interviewees, and subsequently transcribed and analyzed through the qualitative data analysis software NVivo. (I do not recommend NVivo for reasons of cost and functionality, and our team has since transitioned to the feminist software platform ImpactMapper, which I do recommend for qualitative analysis.) Our qualitative coding process was iterative and collaborative, designed to allow for collective reflection and construction of shared understandings around the data. Our team is bi- and trilingual, which helped us analyze interviews conducted in Spanish, Portuguese, and English (see the acknowledgments for the many students who aided in this process). We compiled an initial codebook based on the interview questionnaire and then revised it to incorporate new categories and insights that emerged from our grounded analysis of the transcripts. Themes that emerged included the four common workflow stages—resolving, researching, recording, and refusing and using data—that are described in figure 2.4 and part II of this book. These stages of work were not explicitly included in our interview questionnaire, but they gained prominence through our close reading of the interviews.

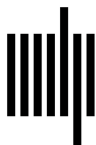
