Timeline:

- From July 1999 to April 14, 2000: Phương was raped. The fetus formed from the first rape was aborted. Phương continued to be manipulated, beaten, and humiliated.
- From April 2000 to 2003: Phương was unsuccessful in her denunciations and official complaints at the workplace. Phương was bullied, slandered, banned from publishing her work, and pressured to resign. She had many suicide attempts. She sought a lawyer but had to stop the lawsuit due to both physical and mental exhaustion.

Letter to Dạ Thảo Phương

Dear Dạ Thảo Phương,

I hear that you've been ill from thinking too much. I understand why you feel sick, but please try to overcome it.

In recent days, I've kept a close eye on your story, following nearly every opinion expressed about it.

At first, I was stunned at your sudden disclosure of the incident. I'm not sure what I would have advised had you consulted me about this matter in advance.

But now I realize that you have acted righteously, and I understand better why you were determined to expose the case.

Sadly, you are met with yet another silence.

More than twenty years ago, you also faced a great silence, even after the completion of all those official reports about the case. Back then, I wondered

why there was such silence, without a final ruling ever being announced. And then you quietly left the office. And it seemed that everything would be forgotten with time.

But since you've returned to this story again after more than twenty years, I understand that it must be impossible for your bottomless pain to heal.

I remember reading your diary after the abortion. I recall seeing you collapse in misery into a chair. It was unbearable for me to witness your pain. "Why are you crying?" I asked. If the child had been conceived from love, it would make sense to cry over this loss. But since the child was conceived as the result of a crime, you needn't feel sorry. I tried to provide you comfort at that time, imploring you to work through your pain rather than helping you seek justice for this cruel act.

In the recent waves of public opinion, many have expressed sympathy and support for you, but I know that you have also been scorned and criticized.

You should have clarified LNA's shamelessly muddled story in which he claimed that he took you to get an abortion twice but did not accompany you on a third visit. This account raised doubts in people's minds about your story. They wondered why you allowed yourself to be impregnated three times and suspected that your encounters with him must have been consensual. But I know that, in fact, he escorted you to an abortion clinic twice and that each time you could not go through with it. When you could put the procedure off no longer, you had the abortion on your third visit, but he was not there with you. That is the truth, but people have misunderstood it. You might try again to clear it up.

More than twenty years ago, I believed you and felt your pain. I feel the same way now.

Your actions have been righteous and confirm to me that you are a mature woman. You are not only joining a personal fight; you are issuing a wake-up call for the entire society. Things seem to have calmed down for the moment, but I don't believe that this story is over.

I think that both your supporters and your detractors have learned a lesson from this experience and will teach their children that they need to trust people but also remain on guard.

You have fulfilled your sacred mission to society. And Bùi Mai Hạnh did as well.

I congratulate you both on your maturity and courage.

I am always your Đỗ Bạch Mai.

I hope you will continue your journey with courage and determination.

Dạ Thảo Phương à,

Cô nghe nói cháu ốm, ốm vì suy nghĩ nhiều.

Cô rất hiểu điều đó, nhưng cháu phải vượt qua.

Những ngày qua, cô đã theo dõi rất kỹ càng sự việc của cháu, gần như không bỏ qua một ý kiến nào.

Lúc đầu cô cũng ngỡ ngàng khi thấy cháu bắt ngờ đưa sự việc ra. Lúc ấy cô đã nghĩ nếu cháu hỏi ý kiến cô thì cô sẽ khuyên cháu như thế nào nhỉ?

Nhưng bây giờ thì cô thấy cháu đã làm đúng và cô càng hiểu vì sao cháu quyết tâm đưa sự việc ra ánh sáng.

Chỉ buồn là lại là một sự im lặng.

Cách đây hơn 20 năm sau tất cả các biên bản là một sự im lặng. Cô cũng thắc mắc tại sao lại im lặng thế nhỉ, không có một công bố gì, và cuối cùng cháu lại lặng lẽ ra đi.

Và tưởng như thời gian sẽ lãng quên tất cả.

Nhưng hơn hai mươi năm sau cháu đã xới lại thì cô hiểu rằng sự đau khổ tột cùng của cháu không thể lành vết sẹo được.

Cô vẫn còn nhớ khi cháu đưa cho cô đọc quyển nhật ký sau khi cháu đi nạo thai. Nhìn bộ dạng đau khổ của cháu khi cháu gục xuống ghế, cô đã không chịu nổi và cô đã mắng cháu: Tại sao cháu lại khóc, đứa con nó là kết quả của tình yêu thì khóc còn có lý nhưng đây nó là kết quả của một tội ác thì cháu không được tiếc thương. Và cô đã phải an ủi cháu để cháu vượt qua, và chỉ mong cháu vượt qua mà cũng không có mục đích truy tìm cái ác.

Sau những cơn sóng của dư luận, cháu đã nhận được rất nhiều ý kiến cả ủng hộ và thông cảm cả sự chê bai miệt thị.

Đáng nhẽ cháu phải lên tiếng nói rõ sự man trá ghê tởm của LNA khi nó lập lờ nói nó dẫn cháu đi nạn thai hai lần và lần thứ ba thì nó không đưa đi. Điều đó làm cho mọi người hoài nghi cháu sao lại để xảy ra nhiều lần thế và người ta tin là có sự đồng thuận.

Cô thì hiểu cháu và cô hiểu là LNA nó dẫn cháu đi hai lần nhưng không dám làm, đến lần thứ ba bắt buộc phải làm thì nó không có mặt. Sự thật là như thế và mọi người đã bị hiểu nhầm. Nếu cần cháu phải nói rõ sự việc này.

Cô đã nói cô tin tưởng cháu và xót thương cháu từ cách đây hơn 20 năm và bây giờ cũng thế.

Hành động của cháu là đúng. Cháu đã là một người đàn bà trưởng thành. Điều mà cháu đang làm không phải chỉ là đấu tranh cho riêng cháu mà là một tiếng nói cảnh tỉnh toàn xã hội.

Bây giờ đừng nghĩ mọi điều lại trở nên im ắng là hết.

Cô nghĩ là cả những người ủng hộ cháu và cả những người dè bừ cháu họ đều rút ra một bài học cảnh báo cho những đứa trẻ của họ và khi giáo dục con bước vào đời không phải chỉ có niềm tin mà còn cần phải biết cảnh giác.

Cô nghĩ cháu đã hoàn thành sứ mệnh thiêng liêng của mình trước xã hội cũng như Bùi Mai Hạnh.

Cô chúc mừng sự trưởng thành và dũng cảm của các cháu.

Cô lúc nào cũng là một Đỗ Bạch Mai của cháu.

Mong cháu kiên cường đi tiếp bằng nghị lực của mình.

ABSTRACT

This forum features fifteen documents translated from Vietnamese into English that address high-profile rape allegations by the poet Dạ Thảo Phương against Lương Ngọc An, a well-known poet and a coworker of hers at Văn Nghệ [Literature and Arts] newspaper. While the assaults allegedly occurred between 1999 and 2000, they were first described in public by Dạ Thảo Phương in a series of Facebook posts during Spring 2022. In addition to Dạ Thảo Phương's posts, the forum includes a range of commentary on the case as well as a second allegation of sexual misconduct against Lương Ngọc An by the poet Bùi Mai Hạnh. We supplement this material with an essay

about the broader legal, social, and cultural context of sexual violence in contemporary Vietnam by Dr. Nguyễn Thu Hương of the Department of Anthropology at the University of Social Sciences and Humanities, Vietnam National University of Hà Nội.

After this time period, the alleged perpetrator cannot be charged for the crime (Article 27, item 1).
